Students will explore the short story form and its various effects. Students will improve critical reading and thinking skills by reading a variety of short stories, examining the essential techniques of short fiction, and considering multiple perspectives on a work of fiction.

C. Outline of Major Content Areas

- 1. Historical background
- 2. Key figures in the development of the genre
- 3. Elements of the short story: plot, character, setting, point of view, imagery, symbolism, theme, tone, style
- 4. Techniques such as dialogue, figurative language, flashback, minimalism and others
- 5. Sub-genres such as detective, horror, science fiction, fantasy.

- 1. Identify unique literary aesthetics of the short story form and its effects (Goals 2b, d; 6a, b, c, e)
- 2. Analyze the basic elements of fiction such as plot, characterization, setting, imagery, and theme (Goals 6a, c, e)
- 3. Explore short stories in their historical and cultural contexts, from the early masters to contemporary authors, including works by authors from under-represented populations and from a variety of cultures (Goals 2a, b, c, d; 6a, b, c, e)
- 4. Interpret short stories and support the interpretation with specific evidence from the stories (Goals 2b, c, d; 6a, c, e)
- 5. Analyze the ways in which short stories help readers to understand ourselves, other people, and the world (Goals 6a, b, c)
- 6. Interpret short stories using a variety of scholarship, perspectives, and critical frameworks, which can give alternate ways of understanding the works (Goals 2b, c, d; 6a, c, e)
- 7. Respond to short stories in reflective and analytical writing (Goals 6c and e)
